Vicki Orford announces retirement from TRH Board

BREWSTER -- After nearly nine years serving on the Three Rivers Hospital Board of Commissioners, Vicki Orford submitted her resignation effective December 31, 2019.

"I've enjoyed it a lot, but I'm ready to move on," Orford said at the board's r e g u l a r meeting on December 4

December 4. "The board is a really great board. It's great to know that we're all go-

ing toward the same goal as far as what we want this hospital to be."

"On behalf of the public hospital Board of Commissioners, administration and staff of this medical facility, and the people of our public hospital district, I would like to thank Vicki Orford for her many years of service, dedication, and leadership," Chairman Mike Pruett stated during the meeting. Orford was presented with a certificate of appreciation, flowers, and a card from the administrative team.

"Vicki has helped to guide our district and hospital through times of struggle and through many major accomplishments," Pruett added. "Her advocacy and leadership style have helped to bring consistency and direction to both the hospital and the governing board. All of us are grateful for the time and energy she has

Orford was appointed to the board on February 28, 2011 and was re-elected to a six-year term in 2017. She took the helm as board chair in January 2014 and continued until January 2019, when Pruett was elected to the role. In turn, she was elected as vice chair.

Longtime commissioner and board secretary Tracy Shrable credited Orford with introducing changes for the better at the hospital.

"She didn't come on [to the board] quietly," Shrable said. "The hammer fell, and that was instrumental. It needed to be done and Vicki did it. From then on, changes started to happen. Thank you."

Orford said she accomplished the goals she set out to do when she first joined. She began her service by encouraging the board and administration at the time to address areas that were not sustainable. Over the years, she has championed being responsible stewards of public funds and encouraged board

session on Dec. 4, the city council approved a resolution relating to the city's 2020 fee schedule. Per the new schedule city water and sewer rates will raise 3.2 percent "which is the CPI (Consumer Price Index) rate with an additional increase that will be divided between two years to cover the water loan and needed sewer repairs," the agenda notes said.

Garbage city administrative fees went up \$2 per customer to cover administrative wages. Zippy Garbage charges will be adjusted in May 2020. Chicks are legal in the city now, but not free. An application fee will set you back \$50, plus a \$15 fee for 1-3 chickens and \$30 for 3-6 chickens.

Residential garbage rates range from \$20.70 for a single 64-gallon can to \$32.10 for a single 96-gallon tote.

Business license fees start at \$55 and run to \$75 for businesses with 40 or more persons. Temporary permits

Pateros School Board Considers Fire District 15 proposal

PATEROS – The school board took a proposal under consideration at its Nov. 25 regular meeting to sell a portion of its Methow School property to Okanogan -Douglas Fire District 15. The fire district wants to expand the

Methow Fire Hall and approached the school district about purchasing a portion of the Methow School property to proceed with the expansion.

School superintendent Greg Goodnight briefed the board about the proposal. Goodnight said he will share the documents provided by the school district's legal counsel with the fire district and report back to the board at its regular December meeting. A public hearing would be held in January 2020 before the proposal is referred to the school board for a vote.

In other board business a timeline was outlined for installation of irrigation and seedling preparation on the eight-acre property that will be the site of new athletic fields. Athletic director Marcus Stennes will help the board determine what type of athletic he recommends as the highest priority.

For academic excellence for the quarter, Principal Mike Hull's report identified eight students with perfect 4.0 GPAs, 26 who made the Superintendent's List, 20 on the Principal's List, and 36 Merit Scholars.

The board approved hiring Tom Asmussen as the high school girls' assistant basketball coach and accepted the resignation of Darryl White as high school girls' assistant softball coach.

members to become involved with the communities and key hospital functions in order to make more informed decisions.

Along with Shrable, she served throughout her tenure on the hospital's Finance Committee. She also introduced board education at their monthly meetings. Topics have ranged from internal processes to Open Public Meetings Act training and Three Rivers Hospital's rural health care advocacy efforts on state and national levels.

"Vicki was faithful, active, and uncompromising in her support of TRH," said board member Leslie McNamara, who was appointed in 2017. "Her leadership was inspiring and goal-oriented, meeting and surpassing even her own benchmarks. As a person who was not afraid to voice her opinions or concerns, I respected her input as well as her model as board chair. She will be greatly missed as a member of our board."

Chief Executive Officer J. Scott Graham said he's sorry to see Orford go, and he thanked her for her unwavering support since he was hired in April 2014.

"I really have appreciated working with Vicki," Graham said. "She was the board chair when I came on and has been super supportive of me, and she is responsible to a large degree for my development here at the hospital... because of her leadership and drive and desire for the hospital."

Three Rivers will soon be seeking letters of interest from residents in the hospital district who would like to serve on the Board of Commissioners.
